Investing in our schools

The NSW Government is investing \$7 billion over the next four years, continuing its program to deliver more than 200 new and upgraded schools to support communities across NSW. This is the largest investment in public education infrastructure in the history of NSW.

The NSW Department of Education is committed to delivering new and upgraded schools for communities across NSW. The delivery of these important projects is essential to the future learning needs of our students and supports growth in the local economy.

Project overview

The upgrade at Canterbury South Public School will deliver:

- A new building with 30 teaching spaces
- A new administration building
- A new library
- A new hall and new canteen
- Covered outdoor learning area (COLA)
- Upgraded landscaping.

Progress summary

Site establishment for the final stage of work has been completed and initial remediation work has been done. The new buildings, Block A and B are both underway, with footing and piers recently installed.

School Infrastructure NSW, Canterbury South P&C members and a Traffic Consultant recently met to review opportunities for a Green Travel Plan for the school.

Next steps

Work will soon commence on the internal link road, with a temporary fence first being installed.

Work will continue on Block A, including the excavation and structure works required for the lift and floor structure. Concrete block pours are expected to occur in coming weeks for Block A and Block B.

Block C works are also due to commence. To accommodate the work, the seating and COLA in this area will be moved temporarily to another area of the school. This is part of the staged plan to ensure the best possible outcome for the students and the construction space.

Works over school holidays (weather permitting)

Some work will be done over the school holidays to create space for the work site. This includes relocating some of the temporary toilet facilities. A small crane (50 tonne) will be brought onsite to do this.

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
