Investing in our schools

The NSW Department of Education is committed to delivering new and upgraded schools for communities across NSW. The delivery of these important projects is essential to the future learning needs of our students and supports growth in the local economy.

Project overview

School Infrastructure NSW is redeveloping Kyeemagh Public School to bring students new and improved facilities and support the growing student community. The project will deliver:

- new flexible learning spaces
- a new library
- a new hall
- new amenities
- a new canteen
- a new covered outdoor learning area (COLA)
- a new staff/administration area.

Progress summary

Roof sheeting for the whole building is nearing completion and scaffolding is starting to be removed. Diagonal origami inspired features are being installed to the building's façade and internal fit out works are progressing well.

Next steps

The below works are expected to take place over the autumn school holidays and in early Term 2.

- Continue internal works including painting and the fit out of bathroom facilities.
- Continued removal of scaffolding.
- Start on the new playground and external works.
- Completion of substation and sewer connection works.
- Start new footpaths and pedestrian works near the school.

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Public domain works

Below is an update on a number of public domain works taking place outside of the school boundary.

Electrical substation upgrade

As part of the ongoing upgrade of public domain infrastructure around the school, the new substation on Jacobson Ave is expected to be installed in the coming weeks. Power is not expected to be transferred to the new substation for a couple of months. You will be notified separately ahead of any disruption to your electrical supply.

Sewerage connection upgrade

The upgrade to the school's sewerage connection will take place in April 2021. Works are scheduled to take place on Jacobson Avenue (opposite the school). Works will take place on the footpath and road to allow a new connection to the existing sewer main across the road.

There will be no interruption to sewerage provision for Kyeemagh residents.

Footpaths and pedestrian accesses

In the coming months works are proposed to take place to upgrade pedestrian access to Kyeemagh Public School, this work is expected to include:

- New footpaths along Beehag St and Tancred Ave
- A kerb ramp on the corner of Mutch Ave, near Beehag St
- A kerb ramp and refuge island on Mutch Ave
- A kerb ramp and refuge island on Tancred Ave
- A kerb ramp and refuge island on Jacobson Ave
- New and relocated bus stops on Jacobson Ave and Beehag St
- A raised pedestrian crossing (wombat crossing) on Beehag St, near Jacobson Ave.

A map of the expected footpath and pedestrian works is available on the next page.

More information will be provided closer to the works starting. Traffic management will be in place where required for the safety of students, staff, the local community and workers.

Frequently asked questions

What are the construction working hours?

Construction hours are 7:00am to 6:00pm Monday to Friday and 8:00am to 1:00pm Saturdays. No work will take place on Sundays or public holidays, unless otherwise notified. The construction site will be closed Friday 2 April 2021 until Monday 5 April 2021, inclusive

What safety measures are in place?

The health and safety of the community and all stakeholders are paramount. Timber hoarding is in place around the construction site to secure the area and prevent public access and ensure a secure barrier between the work and the existing school grounds.

What steps are being taken to control noise and dust?

Noise and dust control measures are being implemented in accordance with planning approval requirements. Hoarding, secure fencing and shade cloth have been erected to reduce noise and dust impacts on the school and local residents. Dust from construction works will be watered down as required.

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
